 Annual State Convention Meeting Minutes and reports of the Committees at the State Website www.kofc-or.org.
- ♦ Members who wish to run for any of the State Officer positions, and Insurance & Associate Delegate to the Supreme Council Meeting in Washington DC on <u>August 3rd to 6th, 2020</u> will need to let the delegate from their Council know, and email the name of the nominee to Sid Thiel.
- Any delegate who seeks recognition to speak, shall press *3 on his phone. He may be contacted by the State Deputy's designee(s) to verify the intent to speak. The delegate shall not mute his phone. If he needs to address the meeting, he will be put through. This is like a radio program where callers are screened and then permitted to speak to listeners.
- Method of Voting. The voting will be conducted through secret electronic balloting by pressing numbers or symbols on delegates' telephones as instructed by the State Deputy unless, due to technological problems, another voting method is directed by the State Deputy.

Challenge by Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William E. Lori

And about three o'clock Jesus cried out in a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, Iema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" ... But Jesus cried out again in a loud voice, and gave up his spirit. And behold, the veil of the sanctuary was torn in two from top to bottom. (Gospel for April 5, Mt 27:46, 50-51)

Sometimes we can get the idea that Jesus was a "nice guy" and that our purpose as Christians is to be nice people who do nice things and don't bother with anything unpleasant. Jesus' heart -rending words from the cross should demolish this misconception. Here the Son of God cries out, quoting Psalm 22, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" He gives us permission to make these words our own — in whatever moments of pain, anguish and suffering we each experience. You and I are invited to pour our hearts out openly to God in trust and confidence.

This month, as we enter Holy Week and consider the passion, death and resurrection of our Lord, firstly I challenge you to pray the Stations of the Cross and to meditate on Christ's anguish in his Passion.

Fourth Degree Former District Master Carroll Gorg had a successful surgery to remove a malignant tumor from the right side of his brain.





As we enter into the fourth quarter of this Fraternal Year I'm reminded of a question the Supreme Knight often asked during our State Deputy Meetings: "Are you leaving a Knights of Columbus footprint?" Financial assistance given by the State Charities has the potential of leaving the Knight of Columbus Footprint over a broad area. Our assistance is an act of charity from a unified group of Catholic men. Our assistance does not just benefit one or a few people, but can be experienced by several.

<u>Rachel Center receives \$3,000 donation</u> Knights of Columbus supports nonprofit that helps pregnant women

Matt Reidy has two checks in his hand but he's not quite ready to hand them to Patsy Hoelscher and spoil the surprise. Reidy is standing in the lobby of Rachel Pregnancy Center on Friday morning with Hoelscher, chairman of the organization's board of directors, and Hal Huntington. Huntington and Reidy are both members of the Knights of Columbus, the Catholic fraternal service group.



They've met with Hoelscher to donate the proceeds from a recent chili contest and silent auction that took place at St. Francis de Sales Cathedral in Baker City.

After a few minutes of conversation, Reidy decides to end the suspense. He turns over the first check, for \$2,526. That's from Smokin' Joe's Chili Contest and silent auction on Feb. 22. But Reidy isn't quite finished; there is the matter of that second check. That \$420 donation comes from the Knights of Columbus state office, which made the donation after local members applied on behalf of the Rachel Center, Huntington said. Hoelscher stares at the two checks for several seconds before uttering a single word. "Wow."

For a nonprofit t organization that relies solely on volunteers and donations and has a single paid employee, an infusion of almost \$3,000 is significant. "This will make a huge difference," Hoelscher said. She said the Rachel Center, a faith based organization founded in 1992 to help women facing an unplanned or crisis pregnancy, will use some of the donation to buy curriculum for the "Earn While Your Learn" education program. Clients can attend classes on prenatal and infant care, parenting and Bible studies and earn "baby bucks" they can spend at the Rachel Center for baby furniture and other items. The idea, Hoelscher said, is to help clients build their self-esteem by gaining new life skills while also acquiring things they need for their babies.

Although the Rachel Center gives away basic clothing, as well as other necessities such as diapers and formula, for free, Hoelscher said clients can also use baby bucks for fancy dresses and other special clothes. "Nice things that they feel good about because they've earned them," she said.

Smokin' Joe's Chili Contest and silent auction is named for Joe Dethloff, a Rock Creek resident and Knights of Columbus member who started the event at St. Francis de Sales. Dethloff died in 2002. Although Dethloff actually started the event in 1989, before the Rachel Center opened, Reidy said the Center became a main recipient of the event's proceeds. The contest and auction continued after Dethloff's death, as his wife, Arlene, supported its continuation. Arlene died in 2017.

Baker City's Knights of Columbus Council 849 decided to resume the event this year and donate proceeds to the Rachel Center, said Huntington, who is the Council's grand knight. Reidy, who is the Council's financial secretary, said more than 50 people and businesses donated items for the silent auction, which raised about \$1,500. "It's really fantastic to have such a giving community," Reidy said.

The chili contest was also successful, with 10 entries. Huntington said he's optimistic that the event honoring Dethloff has new momentum and will continue to be an important source of money for the Rachel Center. The Knights of Columbus have contributed to the Center in other ways, including improvements to its office at 2192 Court Ave.

Hoelscher said the Rachel Center helps about 200 local families and sees an average of 40 clients per month. In addition to programs such as Earn While Your Learn, the Center offers free pregnancy tests, counseling, maternity clothes, prenatal classes and information about adoption.

"If we're going to help a client choose life, we have a responsibility to help them on that journey," Hoelscher said.




Joseph James Burke was born January 26, 1887 in Vancouver, WA to James and Sarah O'Donnell Burke, a pioneer family.

Joseph married Christel Ruby Pender on September 20, 1909 in Vancouver, WA. They had two children, Robert and Marie.


Joseph was a Purchasing Agent for a company in Portland and later managed the Burke Machinery Co. in Portland.

Dear Friends,

What a vision of prayer is offered here! The soul at prayer grows larger than the whole world and can contain it in a loving glance.

Benedict's vision calls us all – monks and lay people – to a prayer that seeks to embrace the whole world in the light of Christ. This doesn't mean that Heaven and Earth are shrunk, but that our souls are expanded. The Christian way of life is meant to lead us to such bright prayer!

May our souls dilate with love for one another, and especially for those who suffer and those who work to ease suffering. In this way, although we are apart, we can hold the troubled world in our prayer.

Dear friends, we are bound together in the strong, vast heart of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. The monks of Mount Angel want you to know that we have you very much in our thoughts, in our hearts, in our prayers. We know you are supporting us too, as you have always done, with your own good thoughts and prayers.

Please try to remember that this is required for Safe Environment. Also, there are still a lot of Councils that need to submit the audits for both August and February.

The SP-7 Columbian Award Application Form is due June 30th. This means it's been processed by Supreme, not just postmarked. However, this can be electronically submitted now. Please start thinking about your submitting this now. As we're required to stay home right now, there are unlimited opportunities for family activities. Those who remain here are isolated from the monastic community and observing the recommended social distancing. All are completing the term through remote instruction. The Benedictine Brewery is also closed, but the brewery taproom is open and can sell bottled beer, with customers standing six feet apart, of course; but no monks are out to meet the customers.

If you are planning to visit Mount Angel in this time, the Abbey church is open during the day for those who wish to visit and pray. Like all churches in this Archdiocese, however, we cannot open for public Mass. Instead, we are live streaming daily Mass, as well as Midday Prayer and Vespers.


