

Into the Breach

Brothers, This past week has been spent in Nashville, TN, at the Supreme Convention. The theme for this Convention has been "Into the Breach", and the speakers there emphasized how that now more than ever, the world needs the Knights of Columbus. We know that since the very beginning, the Knights have always been about Charity and Evangelization. For many of us though, it was a type of Evangelization through our good works. Now however, we are all being asked to become even more, solid witnesses of our Faith.

We are at a pivotal time in this country. The recent decision by the Supreme Court, which overturned Roe v Wade, has been a blessing for so many of us who have been in the trenches for years for the unborn. But the battle is not over. We are only part way there. In Oregon, as in many other states, we still have much work to do in changing peoples' minds and hearts.

More than ever, we need to increase our efforts in our Life programs. The newly released ASAP program (explained later in this newsletter) will be a great benefit for pregnancy resources centers and our homes for unwed mothers. Our Ultrasound Initiative is already saving hundreds of thousands of lives, as women choose not to have an abortion. Our participation in Marches for Life, both nationally and locally, make a powerful statement that cannot be ignored by politicians and the press.

The Supreme Knight, Patrick Kelly, is asking us to become beacons to Catholic families. He is asking us to be "Knights of the Eucharist", through prayer and Adoration. This is the perfect time for us to be working even closer with our priests and bishops, as the bishops in the US begin their National Eucharistic Revival.

Studies show that many Catholics do not believe in the Real Presence, that Jesus Christ is truly present in the Eucharist; Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity. Every Council should be working to help coordinate Holy Hours in their parish, and to reach out to their membership and their fellow parishioners, to invite them to share in Eucharistic Adoration. The Eucharist is the Source and Summit of our Catholic Faith, and is also the source of every good ministry.

The programs we involve ourselves with are complete when we work with the love and sacrifice of the Cross. In addition, we must find a way to invite lapsed Catholics back to the pews. So many simply got out of the habit of Sunday Mass attendance. Let's reach out to these families, and in a loving way, remind them that an hour spent at Mass is an hour where heaven and earth come together. It may be best to begin with Brother Knights, where a simple phone call invitation may make the difference. As the largest Catholic Fraternal Organization in the world, we are the best ones equipped to help our bishops and our priests. As allies with them, we must remember to always pray for our priests and bishops, and to pray for increased vocations. Our priests are getting older and we must help find men willing to be their replacements. In these confusing times, it will take a special effort to find men willing to give up their lives, to bring us the Eucharist.

Another topic that was mentioned at the Convention was our continued support for our Brother Knights in Ukraine. I was very privileged to meet in person the State Deputy from Ukraine, and he was extremely impressed and thankful when I passed on to him the news of Oregon's contributions to the Ukrainian Relief Fund. Of special note, I told him of the Lavang Council 15263's contribution of over \$14,000 to the fund. Many in that Council have first-hand knowledge of what it means to be a refugee. The Ukrainian State Deputy was very thankful, but also warned that help was still needed, that we cannot forget about them. Later in the week, I received the news about District 5's recent donation to the fund and I passed that news on to the Ukraine State Deputy. Once again, he was most grateful that his people were not being forgotten. Even in the midst of the terrible war, the Knights of Columbus show the love of Christ to the world, and that love is even bringing in new Knights, even in Ukraine. The Knights in Poland, because of what they are doing to help the refugees, bring in new members every week. We are making a huge difference in this world, when we are willing to Step into the Breach.

Now, more than ever before, we need to reach out to families, to invite men to share our Brotherhood, to become Knights of Columbus. We need to go where it is not often comfortable to go, to get up in front of the church, to have our membership drives, and to bring more allies into the fight.

Think about what kind of world we want to leave to our children and also our grandchildren. If we want that world to resemble what we grew up with, we must find many more men willing to <u>Step into the Breach</u>.




About The Supreme Monthly Challenge

Membership Recruitment Is Not Hard

Brothers,

Parish picnic time is in full swing, so don't miss a perfect opportunity to be visible and to recruit. First off, make sure Knights of Columbus are part of the work crew. Ask Father or your Parish Council what our Knights can do to help out. Then make sure everyone is wearing Knights apparel. Show your fellow parishioners that you are proud Knights of Columbus.

If you are having a picnic, make sure that during the picnic information about the Knights of Columbus is readily available. Don't be shy about coming up to people and engage with them. But remember to do it right.

No one likes the hard sell. No one is going to say YES, if your line is "Hey, do you want to join the Knights". Try this instead. Look for the couple or the family sitting alone. Probably they are new to the parish and do not know anyone. Come up and introduce yourself and engage with them. "Are you new to the parish? "I don't think we have ever met." Get to know them a little bit, and then **invite them** to be members of your Council. "You seem to be nice people; can I tell you about this group many of us belong to?" Make the invitation to join the Council enticing. And when they respond with "I really don't have any time for that", your response should be; "We don't require any real time commitment. You can give of your time if and when you find one of our activities that appeals to you. In the meantime, we want to add your voice to the 2 million Catholic men who stand up for their faith and their families".

Be prepared to sign them up that afternoon online. Then you can set up for an exemplification later. Too many times good prospects are hard to track down later in the Summer. Busy schedules, vacations, you know the routine. Sign them up online right away. Also, remember to talk to those guys you have asked before. I personally was asked about 6 times before I said yes. Don't be a pain about it, but say something like "Bob, we still have a seat available for you" or "We need one more outstanding man, now is the time". Each new member adds a needed dimension to Councils. Take advantage of a parish picnic as a great time to meet and talk to people you don't get to talk with on Sundays.

One more thing we sometimes forget about. Our priests sometimes are on vacation this time of year. Do you ask the substitute priest if he is a Knight?

If you need some help with an exemplification, don't hesitate to contact Bill Geary, our Ceremonials chief or ask your District Deputy.

State Advocate Report

Members of the Clergy, Worthy District Deputies, Directors, Council and State Officers and Brothers all.

We begin a new year of Fraternity and hopefully we begin with a renewed energy, the need to do much better as a state, with the Safe Environment Program (SEP or S/E). At the summer meeting held in Hermiston, our District Deputies were alerted to the new plan getting them more involved with their Councils. More of a direct hands on with the S/E program and their Councils. The District Deputies now have the role of monitoring twice

monthly their Councils status with S/E, based on the information passed on to them from the MPC (Membership Program Coordinator) report which comes to the State Deputy and Advocate.

Since Supreme has just issued new training completion dates to incoming Council Officers, it is only fair to allow those Knights to come up to speed for themselves and their Councils. A brief status report was sent to all our District Deputies on August 3rd. It is now the responsibility of the District Deputy to contact the OYP (Office of Youth Protection) group at Supreme to receive a status update on non-compliant Councils. By the middle of September, most if not all our Councils should have met their training requirements. From that time on our Districts will be required to report on the status of why and how any such non-compliant Council will meet the goal of being compliant. If your Council is compliant or becomes compliant, then there is no need for a monthly status report. Please, make the effort to get this important work of our order completed.

<u>Ceremonials:</u> The State Ceremonials team for the Charity, Unity and Fraternity and the District Masters 4th degree team will be starting this Fraternal Year beginning on Saturday August the 13th in Hillsboro. With the tremendous organizational help of our District Master Duane Morris and District Deputy Michael Pranger, St. Matthew's parish center will be the venue. The registration will begin at 12 noon with the 3-degree ceremonies beginning at 1 PM. The 4th degree ceremony will begin promptly at 2 PM. A flyer has been distributed by our State Executive Secretary, Pat Rice <u>patrick.lee.rice@gmail.com</u> so please email him or Duane <u>dlmorri@gmail.com</u> if you need a new copy. This is only the beginning of our effort to meet our intake goal for 2022- 2023. Please continue at the District and Council level to double your membership efforts. The State Degree team and the District Master will always make our teams available to assist you when they are called upon. Please keep checking your emails for announcement flyers for upcoming exemplification dates and locations.

<u>Vocations and Pennies from Heaven:</u> This always seems to be the easiest and certainly the most rewarding area for us all to provide a report to our jurisdiction.

<u>RSVP</u> (<u>Refund Support Vocations Program</u>): The Fall Term at our seminary is approaching. It's time to consider your Council sponsorship for the Fall on behalf of a seminarian. No names are available yet, however, if your Council is planning to have a sponsorship let me know as soon as possible as we are building a list. Also, the names of the seminarian(s) whom you plan to re-sponsor.

<u>Cor Christi:</u> This program, at the Bishop White Seminary at Gonzaga University, has now finally gotten a good look from Councils in the Northwest. Remember that a \$500 donation to this program is looked at by Supreme in the same vein as the regular RSVP commitment and is treated dollar for dollar the same with the \$100 rebate.

This is the beginning of the journey to the priesthood for these young men. Your work here is very important.

Christopher Fund & Pennies from Heaven: Our worthy State Deputy was alerted by the administrator of the Christopher fund at Supreme several weeks ago that an opportunity for receiving some of the benefits of that fund had arisen. Therefore, our State Deputy Brother Ray Prom, Brother Ron Boyce, IPSD (President of Oregon K of C Charities) and our State Vocations Chairman, arranged for a meeting with President/Rector of the seminary, Monsignor Joseph Betschart. On Friday July 22nd a presentation was made at the his office by the Charities President and Vocations Chairman. Presented was a \$23,000 check to the Seminary from our most recent Pennies from Heaven effort, which was finalized at our 2022 Convention held in Lebanon. The second check presented was for \$196,000. From the Christopher Fund. Yes, six digits. Take a bow, for you have always done great work with your generosity. You have begun the 2022-2023 Fraternal Year with a very good start. Let's get ahead in the game and not play catch-up. Checks Presented To The Seminary

On Friday July 22nd, State Deputy Brother Ray Prom (who was the taking pictures), Brother Ron Boyce, IPSD (President of Oregon K of C Charities) and Brother Bill Geary, State Vocations Chairman, arranged for a meeting with the President/Rector of the seminary, Monsignor Joseph Betschart. A presentation was made at his office by the Charities President and the Vocations Chairman.



Presented was a \$23,000 check to the Seminary from our most recent Pennies For Heaven effort, which was finalized at our 2022 Convention held in Lebanon. The second check presented was for \$189,000 from the Christopher Fund.

Council In Action

The Holy Trinity Knights of Beaverton, Msgr. Charles P. Taaffe Council 14802, helped the Franciscan Sisters, at Our Lady of Peace retreat house, by moving about 50 yards of chipped wood mulch out of their main parking lot to a storage area on the grounds. The mulch is used to cover walk ways and as ground cover in the gardens. Due to the rains earlier this year, the tree trimming service truck could not get through the soft ground, so the mulch had to be dropped in the parking lot. Now that the ground is hard again, five Holy Trinity Knights, with the aid of tractor and two trailers, spent 8 hours "moving the pile". The parking lot is now clear and the mulch is being spread around the property. The Sisters are very happy to have the parking lot cleared and Sr. Angela (seen in the picture below) even helped with cleanup.



Off to a Good Start:

The first form turned in for the new Fraternal Year is the Report of Assembly Officers Chosen for the Term using Form 186 or it is preferred that you use the online method to submit your Officers listing. If not using the online method, please scan in your report and email to membershiprecords@kofc.org. Remember that even if the Assembly has the same Officers from last year, this form must still be submitted to Membership Records.

Please be sure to include copies to your State Deputy, District Master and Vice Supreme Master.

As stated, this form is preferred to be submitted through Member Management and the online method.

However, adding to the whole form confusion, at the bottom of this form it states "This form is intended for submission through regular mail." It also states to E-MAIL – membershiprecords@kofc.org so what should you do? Please email the completed form!

<u>The Annual Assembly Audit Report</u> utilizing Form 1315 is the second form of the new Fraternal Year to get turned in to Supreme. By turning in the Audit Form a couple things are assured. The bond on your Comptroller is retained and later in the year when the Assembly is submitting forms for Star Assembly, you can check off that one box regarding Audit completed.

Please be sure to include copies to your District Master and Vice Supreme Master.

Even though the form states to mail original to Supreme Master, he has a big helper to manage all this paperwork so please email the Audit Form to the Supreme Master's Executive Administrative Assistant, Justyna Padilla (Justyna, Padilla @Kofc. Org).

Have you found a Patriotic Day to celebrate?

<u>Life Program Director Report</u> Reflection

Brother Knights,

A couple years ago, I was praying the rosary along with two women at Planned Parenthood. We were holding pro-life signs and praying while walking around the building. Suddenly a woman came out of the building and stopped us. She yelled "Why are you here? What makes you think you can tell me what to do with my body?" When the two women with me started to respond, the pro-abortion woman immediately stopped them. She said "No, I want to hear from him (pointing to me)". I responded "The child is not part of your body, but is a distinct separate human person, with different DNA and has an eternal soul. The mother and father do not own their children. God is the Author of all Life and the creator of every child. God has entrusted us to take care of these children that are a gift to us". I was

surprised that she did not respond and I do wonder if that answer really sunk in! It is important to reflect on the fact that she needed to hear the answer from a man.

The current pro-abortion movement in our society is a direct attack on the family and on our God. How many times have we seen their signs stating "My Body, My Choice" or "No Uterus, No Voice". Not only has the child been reduced to a worthless piece of tissue that can be discarded from the women's body, but this movement is also an attack on men. The men's role as husband and father has been clearly diminishing. The pro-abortion women feel that men have no say regarding their abortion decision and the secular laws in our country support this. Yet, the mother and father are equally responsible for this child. So, this responsibility starts at the very moment the couple decide to have sex.

The truth is, sometimes men help to feed the flames of the pro-abortion movement primarily because of:

- 1) Irresponsibility,
- 2) Ignorance, and
- 3) Indifference. So many men have abandoned the mother immediately after pregnancy. Many men feel the abortion issue should be left up to the woman only. Many men who have been involved in an abortion in their past often bury their feelings and are in a state of denial regarding the magnitude of what they did. Many men feel uncomfortable being a part of pro-life groups or even talking about abortion.

Please consider getting involved in pro-life work and being a role model for future fathers and the voice for these vulnerable precious children. We are all one body, one family in Christ.

We need light to recognize our grave responsibility as husbands and fathers. <u>Supreme Knight Announces New Pro-Life Initiative</u>

In early June, Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly announced the ASAP (Aid and Support After Pregnancy) program, a new initiative to strengthen K of C assistance for pregnancy resource centers and maternity homes. For every \$500 that a Council donates to a qualified pregnancy resource center or maternity home — up to \$2,000 in the 2021-22 Fraternal Year — the Supreme Council will add \$100, a 20% increase.

"Repeal of Roe won't be the end of abortion in America," the Supreme Knight said. "But it might be the beginning of the end. ... In a post-Roe world, we need to be there for mothers and children. They will need our help more than ever — so let's make the ASAP program a top priority."

Roe vs Wade

The following is a great write-up to help let non-members know more about the works that the Knights do daily in our communities. It might just capture the attention of parish men, and give them that push to join us.

I am following up on a request from our State Deputy to have the attached statement put in parish bulletins throughout the state. Please feel free to contact me if I can be of any assistance.

On June 24, 2022, the Supreme Court over-turned Roe v. Wade. This is truly a gift from God and a historic day for our country. Many have been waiting for this day, particularly those on the front lines standing for life at abortion centers and others who are working countless hours behind the scenes to save these precious children. This Supreme Court decision was a critical step in the right direction by moving the decision to the state level but we know our work is still in front of us. Although many states will make the right decision and ban abortion, other states including Oregon, will only increase abortions by accepting out-of-state mothers who want to abort their child.

Now is the time to step up our efforts, not only voting for pro-life candidates, but also increasing our support for pregnancy centers and ultrasound installations.

The Oregon Knights of Columbus have been providing this support. The Knights of Columbus serve in four different action categories: Faith, Community, Family and Life. The Life Program includes the Ultrasound Grant, Marches for Life, Special Olympics, Christian Refugee Relief, Silver Rose, Mass for People with Special Needs, Pregnancy Center Support, and also the Novena for Life.

The Knights are also involved in installing memorials for the unborn, rallies for life, prayer vigils and special services in honor of unborn victims of abortion. The Knights of Columbus ultrasound grant initiative has proven to save innocent lives.

This program is helping women choose life by giving them the opportunity to view their unborn children on the ultrasound machines at pro-life pregnancy centers. Because more than 70% of undecided women decide to have their child after seeing an ultrasound, it has been estimated that one ultrasound machine in a pregnancy care center may save the lives of 1,000 unborn children.

Knights in Oregon have provided at least 30 ultrasounds since 2014, which means our efforts may possibly have saved 30,000 lives. Please consider supporting Knights events and for those men sitting on the fence, there is no better time to jump in and join the Knights of Columbus. The Knights of Columbus are saving lives and making a difference in our communities.

The Good Samaritan

Homily, In part, by Fr. Angelo Te, Pastor of Sacred Hearth Parish Tillamook, Oregon Homily given at St. Joseph's Satellite church Cloverdale, Oregon on Sunday July 10, 2022

We all know the story about the Good Samaritan and how the Levite and priests walked by and would not help him after he was robbed and beaten.

At Sunday Mass, Fr. Te told us a true story about how this lesson was used and inserted into a seminarian class by a learned professor who had extensive knowledge and tenure with his position.

The professor challenged his 15 students to write something about the Good Samaritan and showed how much they had learned from the Bible story. His one caveat was that they had until 5 p.m. on a Friday afternoon to complete the paper. Those who were late would fail the class – no exceptions.

Meanwhile, unbeknownst to the students, the professor had hired several actors who were to place themselves along the way where the students would walk that Friday afternoon. Each actor was to portray an injured person or one who needed immediate attention and some medical aid.

However, the seminarians, as the professor had already planned, were to be kept as busy as possible so that they would barely have enough time to run from their dormitory back to the classroom to turn in their paper. Late of Friday, as the students were released from their duties, they knew that they barely had enough time to run to the computers and finish their work and print it out and rush off to the classroom. It was a couple of minutes to five. Breathlessly, as they ran down the walkway, they saw some people bleeding and in agony, but they knew that they did not have time to stop. Surely someone who is not as rushed will assist the injured person. So, they continued and rushed by without looking at these men. They just had to get their paper to the professor. Time was running out. They had to rush. They had to run. In the end, all of them, nearly without any breath left, handed in their papers – all 15 of them.

The professors then asked them if they saw the injured men on their way to the classroom. They all acknowledged that they had seen them, but that time was running out and they had to get the papers to him in order to pass the test.

Yes, they all passed the test of meeting the time limit, but <u>all failed to have compassion</u> in their lives. They failed to render aid to someone in distress and surely needing help.

Fr. Te also mentioned that in the Bible, Jesus only mentions compassion twice. The first was with the Good Samaritan story and the second was His compassion for the 5,000 who came to hear him and did not have any food to eat, but that he then provided them with fish and loaves of bread to eat. Jesus was filled with compassion!

As you go about your day – will you be filled with compassion for those around you who are suffering or sick and in distress? I hope that your answer is YES!

If not us, then who?

Now, the Bible story:



A Jewish man was traveling on a trip from Jerusalem to Jericho, and he was attacked by bandits. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him up, and left him half dead beside the road. By chance, a priest came along. But when he saw the man lying there, he crossed to the other side of the road and passed him by. A Temple assistant walked over and looked at him lying there, but he also passed by on the other side. Then a despised Samaritan came along, and when he saw the man, he felt compassion for him. Going over to him, the Samaritan soothed his wounds with olive oil and wine and bandaged them. Then he put the man on his own donkey and took him to an inn, where he took care of him. The next day he handed the innkeeper two silver coins, telling him, 'Take care of this man. If his bill runs higher than this, I'll pay you the next time I'm here.' "Now which of these three would you say was a neighbor to the man who was attacked by bandits?" Jesus asked. The man replied, "The one who showed him mercy." Then Jesus said, "Yes, now go and do the same." Luke 10:30-37

Who Were The Samaritans & Why Were They Despised?



The region of Samaria that is frequently mentioned in the New Testament has a colorful history that helps us understand many things written in the four Gospels.

Samaria was the area between Judea and Galilee that had been the northern kingdom of Israel after Judah. Israel split into two monarchies following the death of Solomon around 931 BC. Some two hundred years later, in 726–722 BC, the Assyrian king Shalmaneser V invaded the region, captured the capital city of Samaria and deported many of its inhabitants to Assyrian cities in Mesopotamia. But some of the Samaritans remained in their land and eventually mixed with other groups who moved

into the area.

This mixed – partly Jewish and partly pagan – population represented the Samaritans of Jesus' day. Although they worshiped the same God as the Jews and strictly upheld the commands of the Mosaic law, their religion was rejected by Judaism – both because of their partly Gentile ancestry, and because the Samaritans accepted only the first five books of the Bible and worshipped in their temple on Mount Gerazim in Samaria rather than in the Temple in Jerusalem.

As a result, the Samaritans were despised by most Jews — who treated their northerly neighbors terribly, as virtual "untouchables." The depths of this terrible disdain can be seen in the fact that Samaritans could not even be accepted as converts to Judaism. Rather than "contaminate" themselves by passing through Samaritan territory, Jews who travelled between Judea and Galilee would often cross over the River Jordan in order to bypass Samaria, rather than going through the area. Those who did take the direct route would hurry so as not to stay overnight there and would even refuse to eat in that area.

The attitude is reflected in later statements in the Jewish Talmud such as: "He that eats the bread of the Samaritans is like to one that eats the flesh of swine" (Mishnah Shebiith 8.10). Perhaps understandably, the Samaritans developed a deep antipathy toward the Jews, and there is no question that there was a great deal of mutual hostility and religious rejection between the two cultures (Luke 9:52-53).

This was the situation in the society into which Jesus was born. When we understand this background, we see how remarkable Jesus' teaching and actions regarding the Samaritans truly were. We can sense the shock among many of his Jewish listeners when Christ told the parable of the "Good Samaritan," an individual he held up as being not only "our neighbor," but also someone more righteous than a representative priest and Levite – the Jewish religious professionals of that day (Luke 10:25–37).

The nature of Jewish-Samaritan relations (or lack of them) helps us to realize what a statement it was that Jesus chose to pass directly through Samaria instead of crossing the Jordan to avoid the area on the way to Jerusalem (John 4:4-5). When Jesus spoke with a Samaritan woman outside one of their cities, it was directly contrary to Jewish custom (John 4:9), and when he agreed to eat with the Samaritans of the area – and even stay with them overnight – it was the ultimate outrage from the perspective of the Jews: Jesus accepted the Samaritans as being no different from the Jews themselves.

When Jesus healed ten lepers from the border of Samaria (Luke 17:11-16) – at least one of whom was a Samaritan (vs. 16) – he showed he loved the Samaritans just as much as anyone else. In his teaching and serving alike Jesus accepted and cared for the Samaritans in a manner that completely negated their "untouchable" status in the eyes of many.

So, despite widespread Jewish antipathy, it is not surprising that the early Church recognized Samaritans as equal to Jews. Many Christians spread through the area of Samaria (Acts 8:1), and the evangelist Philip taught there (Acts 5:3-8). Significantly, the leading apostles Peter and John were sent on a special mission to the area in order to confirm those Samaritans who had been baptized by Philip (Acts 8:14-17) — to show that their acceptance was the official position of the Church.

The ready acceptance of Christianity by many Samaritans is likely due to their expectation of a *Taheb* or "Restorer," a messiah-like figure whom they understood would be the prophet like Moses foretold in the Scriptures (Deuteronomy 18:15, 18). The *Taheb*, they thought, would be so much like God that anyone who believed in him would believe in the *Taheb*'s Lord (God himself).

In his ministry, Jesus had taught that the time was coming when worship in the temples of both Jerusalem and Samaria would no longer be important (John 4:21), and the conversion of Samaritans was one of the first steps in the realization of that truth. The acceptance of Christianity by many Samaritans became a clear intermediate step between the preaching of the Gospel to the Jews and to the Gentiles – just as Christ had predicted (Acts 2).

Even today a few ethnic Samaritans still survive in their homeland – mainly in the city of Nablus in northern Israel – and have maintained their traditional identity and worship. Some Samaritan Christians also maintain their faith – descendants of the second oldest Christian community in the world, and the only group of believers founded outside of Judea by Jesus himself.

Hello, Brothers. Summer is a great time to initiate some Family programs in your Council.

Family of the Month

Each month, the Council Family of the Month committee selects one parish family that models Christian family values and visibly lives them every day. Report the Family of the Month using the online Form 10784. Once a year, each participating Council selects one of the previous twelve Family of the Month

winners to represent the Council/parish as the potential state and international Family of the Year. The Oregon State Family of the Year entry form is due by March 15th, and the State Family of the Year award is presented at the Annual State Convention. The Knights of Columbus Family of the Year is chosen by the Supreme Council and recognized yearly at the Supreme Convention. For Family of the Month/Year resources, visit www.kofc.org/familyofthemonth.

In addition, the Family of the Month can be a Featured Program that counts for two program credits toward the Columbian Award. The requirements are: Recognize twelve families throughout the Fraternal Year (one each month) and submit a Family of the Year to the state. Report activity using the Fraternal Programs Report Form (#10784) each month and a Family of the Year Entry Form (#10680).

It is not too late to submit your July Family of the Month; the 10784 form is due to Supreme by August 15th. Also, be sure to note your Family of the Month on your monthly state Service Program Family Report form, worth 200 points.

Summer is also an excellent time to schedule your Family Week. Councils should dedicate a special week of the year in order to recognize the vital importance of families as the foundation of our domestic church and to promote Catholic family values. When choosing a week, Councils should consider factors that might affect parishioner schedules such as school vacations, holidays and other local events. Though traditionally celebrated in the summer to commemorate the birth and death of our founder, Blessed Michael J. McGivney, this program can take place anytime during the year. Family week activities might include a family picnic, a movie night, or a sporting event. You can also partner Family Week with your Rosary Program and host a rosary open to all families. Other ideas include pairing Family Week with a Family Prayer Night or a Holy Hour that includes families. Check the Supreme website under What We Do for more Faith in Action resources for Family Programs.

Finally, don't forget that Food For Families is a year-round program. In the summer, encourage your members to donate any excess fruit and vegetables from their garden to your local food pantry. Ask the pantry to track donations from Knights of Columbus members so that you can include it in your Food For Families report at the end of the Fraternal Year. Remember that Supreme will refund \$100 for each 1,000 pounds of food donated, up to a maximum of \$500. Those tomatoes, squash and pears add up fast. Also, fresh fruit and vegetables are especially appreciated by most food pantries and the families they serve.

Send me your good ideas for Family Programs, and we'll share them with other Councils.

Please remember our Council level Soccer Kick starts in September 2022. Start looking for location to host your competition.



There have been a couple of instances in the past year where people have been asked to have a heightened sense of alertness to something or someone that could cause issues. Last year on Columbus Day weekend, we were even asked by the Archdiocese of Portland if we could help with having people watch the property. Kudos to those who have been involved in this. We want to take it one step further. We have been working on implementing a Safety/Security online training course for those Councils and parishes who feel this would be a benefit to them. This has become more of a priority for Councils and parishes due to the Supreme Court leak and the increased protests from pro-abortionists. A Brother Knight from McMinnville, Chuck Pattishall, has stepped up to be the lead contact for Councils who would like to implement a Safety program or would like more information. Chuck has a history in law enforcement and is the right person to help with this kind of program. This is a comprehensive program—not just in protecting our priests and our churches—but in learning how to de-escalate a situation, increased awareness for ushers and greeters, and in how to help make sure that the physical property in a parish is safe and well maintained. 



Blessed Michael McGivney Fund Grant Guidelines

Applicant must be a Oregon Knight, the widow or orphan unmarried child under age 26 of such Knight.

Applicant must have been in the Order for at least one-year.

Applicant must be in "good standing".

Applicant must be a member of the requesting Oregon Council.

Grants are provided based on financial need, not on the applicant's activities as a Knight.

Funds are for the "Necessities of Life." Example: housing, utilities or food - not to reduce debt Applicant cannot receive two grants for the same situation.

The situation should not pre-date the applicant's entry into the Order.

Applicant cannot receive a grant more often than once every two years.

Funds cannot be used to purchase real property or automobiles for the applicant.

If the applicant is the Grand Knight or Financial Secretary, the District Deputy should make the investigator selection and sign the application as the FS or GK.

Oregon State will not provide application status to anyone except the Grand Knight.

The State Secretary is the only one who may contact the Council for clarification. If possible, screening committee members are asked to respond to the application within 24 hours. E-mail your recommendation to the State Secretary and to all the screeners who are evaluating the same application. The applications and all the personal information, especially names and Councils are confidential!

Parade of Past State Deputies

John Adolph Rekart 41st State Deputy of Oregon 1987-1989



John Adolph Rekart was born on October 15, 1916 to Russian immigrants, Anton and Katherine Garrits Rekart at his parents' home in Portland aided by a team of Russian midwives.

John attend St. Agatha School where he remained a member of St. Agatha Church his entire life. John served in the Navy during WWII.

As a young man, John worked almost at every store and shop in the area where he lived.

In 1941 John met Helen Moell at a basketball function held at St. Agatha Church. Three weeks later John married Helen on May 18, 1941 in Portland, OR. The couple had eight children.

John was Grand Knight of the Milwaukie Council 3378 in 1966 and a member of the Council until 1979. In that year he became a charter member and $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ Grand Knight of the St. Agatha Council 7388.

John was District Deputy for years 1981 and 1982. He held many State Chairman and Director positions including one as State Historian. He was elected as State Deputy in 1987 but never held any other State Office.

St. James Pew Project

The Knights are leading the refurbishment of pews at St. James Church in Molalla. Existing pews have been in place since the parish opened in 1962. There had been a need to repair and secure the legs for safety. Faded seat backs and chipped veneer needs repairing and staining to once again restore the appearance and extend life of each pew.

Original quotes to rebuild the pews were over \$90,000 and prompted consideration of new pews at a cost quoted at more than \$120,000. Knights, in conjunction with the local Furniture Doctor, provided a repair and refurbish alternative estimate of less than \$7,000. The refurbishment project will take an estimated 7 months with volunteer help of Knights and Parishioners.

We are using the local Furniture Doctor to work on veneer and unique repairs needed. All screws securing the pews are being replaced with a corrosion resistant alternative. Faded seat backs are being completely sanded down and stained. All surfaces are receiving a new protective topcoat. As of the end of July this year all pews have been securely fastened to the Church floor with the new screws. Refurbishment has begun and is projected to be complete by Christmas of this year.

With proper ongoing maintenance these pews should be in service for the life of our Church.
