ON THE OCCASION OF HIS BEATIFICATION: REFLECTIONS ON FR. MICHAEL J. MC GIVNEY

We are invited to reflect on the holy life of Father Michael J. McGivney at this moment in history.

Michael McGivne, the eldest son of an immigrant family, put off studying for the priesthood to support his family by working for three years in a spoon factory. Later, he attended the seminary, learning a foreign language to better serve the local people. The untimely death of his father foreshadowed a focus on family life that would become the hallmark of his priestly efforts.

When he became a parochial vicar, he was assigned to serve a parish in massive debt. He was just 29 years-old at the time, but he served his community well — helping to pay down debt and by founding what would become one of the largest lay organization in the Catholic Church.

He was a priest whose zeal for souls led him to convert a convicted murderer. He was a preacher whose message of hope, charity and truth inspired the conversions of Yale undergraduates and the daughter of a Protestant clergyman. He was a man whom soldiers followed; a leader whose vision created room for new leaders to serve in new roles in the Church. He enjoyed baseball and skeet shooting, encouraged young adults to join drama and abstinence societies. He refused to permit the breakup of families.

May Father McGivney continue to intercede for each of us, and may his life and virtue call us to renewal of our own lives as Catholics and Knights.



Donation Of Goods Welcomed

As Oregon and other states in the Pacific Northwest have been experiencing devastating fires, many have needed to evacuate their homes. Others have lost their homes. During this time, many members of the Knights of Columbus have been calling one another to assess the situation in their specific areas. Many have provided us information about locations needing supplies, donations, etc. and where those donations could be dropped off.

Seeing this need for aid, many members of the Knights of Columbus stepped into the breach and sent supplies to many of these locations. In the Clackamas County area, several Knights of Columbus drove into the heart of evacuated territories to donate sleeping bags and socks. These supplies were requested by the local evacuation supply hub. Bentley's Feed Store in Molalla was one such hub collecting supplies such as sleeping bags, tents, air mattresses, socks, under-garments, etc.

I have been fortunate lately to be able to visit Councils in person or by online meetings. It is extremely exciting to do this and to learn what you are doing out there, yet we can do more. I am working on 5 questions that I will be asking the Councils I visit. I will be reaching out to your Council during the next few months and will send these questions for all your members to answer. I am looking for candid answers so I can help you in the future.

The first weekend of Oct I was fortunate to be able to visit Klamath Falls and Medford in southern Oregon. There I had some very pleasant visits with the DD of District 9 (Joe Schaecher) and 11 (Ipo Ross). As you may have heard, the Council in Klamath Falls has developed a potters field for unclaimed remains and they are looking to expand it. It is a lovely location and represents their commitment to helping those who have been lost. They have also developed a nice tribute to our armed forces at the cemetery and it consists of symbols of each branch of our armed service on pedestals; on top of the pedestals are the flags of each branch. They have also included the new branch of Space Force. I would encourage everyone to visit this site.

While in Medford I was asked to help distribute food to the poor. Council 1594 had received a nice shipment of food from Supreme. It felt particularly good to be helping support the families who needed this food. I helped one lady who was very much in need of the food and in talking with her I found out her house was burned down during the fires and she was living out of her car. There are many displaced families in the area, and they continue to need our help.

I was able to tour the area of Talent and Phoenix where the fires did the most damaged in Southern Oregon. It was very eye opening to see the devastation that occurred. There were blocks of homes that were destroyed, but every now and then, you saw a building that had not been touched while all around it was gone. All these families need our help.

I was on the phone with our Supreme representative and we were talking about events the Councils have done to help their communities during this pandemic. Here are just a couple of things that Councils can do during the pandemic:

- hold a dinner meal drive through
- hold a breakfast drive through

On both of these events, Council sold tickets in advance and they were very well received by the parish community. You could hold garage sales with social distancing, clean the parish grounds, work with your pastor for projects that the parish needs—think outside of the box and look for new ways of doing events. These are also good ways to recruit new members by asking a potential member if he would like to help so he can see what we do. Set up a tent or table outside of your church entrance to recruit new members. Remember, for your Council to survive and grow, we need new members. How many of your friends know you are a Knight? Do not hide under a rock, bring it into the light of day. Let them know what the Knights do and stand for and there is a good chance you may soon have a new member.

October is Catholic History Month

When the idea was pitched for Catholic History Month, the question was asked; "Why October?" The response was "Because in October is the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary which honors the battle of Lepanto". Next question asked; "What is the battle of Lepanto?"

The feast of Our Lady of the Rosary used to be called the feast of Our Lady of Victory which was set into the liturgical calendar by Pope Pius V to honor the Virgin Mary and the Rosary. Our Lady and the Rosary played a role in one of the greatest sea battles of all time, the Battle of Lepanto. It is one of the greatest when you look at both the magnitude of the battle and by what was at stake if the battle outcome had been different.



On October 7, 1571, the ships of the Holy League assembled off the coast of Greece near the port of Lepanto to confront a menace to the Mediterranean, the navy of the Ottoman Empire. The Ottomans at this time were the chief agent in the spreading of Islam. The ships of the Ottoman Sultans were actively terrorizing the Mediterranean with piracy, naval war, coastal raids and invasion. In the year prior to Lepanto there was a successful invasion of Cypress, a Venetian/Greek Orthodox island, and an unsuccessful attempt to invade Malta, which was successfully defended by the Knights of St. John. The attempt on Malta made it clear that the Ottomans desired to control the entire Mediterranean and further their conquests to carry the Q'oran westward. The Holy League was called for by Pope Pius V when he saw the threat to Western Europe. Through the Pope's diplomacy the military forces of The Holy Roman Empire, Spain, Portugal, Genoa, Venice and various knightly orders, combined to confront the Ottoman navy at Lepanto, their main port in the Adriatic.

The battle involved some 550 ships and some 75,000 men. The ships of the Holy League introduced technological advancements worth mentioning. The galleasses of the Catholic League were designed to raise the height of the deck to make it difficult for the Ottomans lower ships to board and easier for the Leagues marksmen to shoot down on the Turks galleys and corsairs. And for the first time cannons were added to the sides of the ship adding to the cannons commonly placed in the bows and sterns making it possible to fire on the enemy no matter the direction. There were some new spiritual achievements too, the soldiers and sailors were given and asked to pray the rosary. This connected the spiritual parts of the battle with the material parts.

Also, introduced from the Americas was a replica of the Image of Virgin of Guadalupe. This replica image had been touched to the original and was sent to Europe to promote the message of the Virgins appearance to Juan Diego. It was placed aboard The Real, the flag ship for the armada, in the hopes for the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The battle was fierce. The League sailed into battle with their ships in the formation of a Cross while the Turks formation was a crescent. Just before the two massive fleets met the wind changed in the favor of the Holy League and afterwards the Christian sailors and soldiers gave thanks to Mary for her intercession.

The battle lasted several hours and ended with the sinking or burning of 50 Turkish galleys and the capture of 117 more. More importantly the Ottoman Navy was decimated to the point that they were unable to threaten the Mediterranean again.

There is much more to the battle then can be written about here. There are more miracles, there are heroes and villains, and there is a famous author who was wounded during the battle. There is more political intrigue involving almost all the nations of Europe. One of the greatest English language epic poems written by G K Chesterton is about the Battle of Lepanto. This is a good place to start if you would like to learn more about the battle.

So why October? It's a good place to start when learning our history. We continue to develop a program slowly. The effort was intended to inspire you to support the development of a larger CHM (Catholic History Month) program that can be used as a platform for teaching, learning, defending, and evangelizing the Faith.

Small steps have been made. For the future we are hoping to inspire you, the Knights of this State, to do something in October to support, promote or encourage CHM. Learning Catholic history is probably new to most of you. Your Catholic education has probably been focused on anything from liturgy, Sacred Tradition, Scripture, spirituality, the saints, etc. Catholic history has not played a big role, if any role at all for most of us. We would like to change that. If only to give another way to connect to the faith.

Member Recalls Loss of Fathers Chalice and Flag in Almeda Fire

As the Alameda Fire started in Ashland and then moved through the town of Talent and into the town of Phoenix, Matt Sekreta did all he could to save his own home and carpet business. Matt is a member of Council 11258 in Central Point, and just a few short weeks prior to the fire he laid to rest his Dad. Dr. Emanuel Joseph Sekreta died in June, just a couple weeks short of his 97th birthday. He had been a Knight for 67 years and a 4th Degree Knight for 62 years. As the COVID-19 took a grip on our nation it had (and has) taken a particularly harsh grip on our elderly community. Matt recognized this issue with his Dad and thought of an idea to cheer him up. He requested and received a flag for his Dad that had once flown over our Nation's Capital. The flag was presented to his Dad with his son Matt on the other side of a glass window. Although Matt was unable to hug his Dad, the smile he received was as big as life. Matt shared his story with Medford Assembly 905 during their Flag Day Ceremony.

The fire that ripped through these towns in Southern Oregon was particularly hot. As officials in the area gave permission, Matt was anxious to sift through the ashes in what remained of his Superior Carpet building. The precious 4th Degree Chalice presented on behalf of his Dad during his funeral was on his mind but never really expecting to find remnants at all since he had left both the Chalice and the Flag in his office on the 2nd floor office. He was shocked to find both. One surprise after another. The Flag had melted and was actually lying on top of the paten that came with the chalice.

Both the remnants of the Flag and Chalice will be buried with his Dad when family is able to gather once again. Matt said a replacement Chalice is important so that it can be presented to a newly ordained Priest this Spring at the Cathedral in Portland.

Five Rules for Catholic Politicians (from Catholic Answers Daily, 10/06/2020)

1) It is every politician's duty to make sure the law recognizes the right to life of all innocent human beings. As the Catechism says, "The inalienable right to life of every innocent human individual is a constitutive element of a civil society and its legislation." (2273)

2) This duty includes working for laws that protect an unborn child's right to life. Protecting unborn human beings from being killed by abortion does not impose Catholic morality; it upholds universal and fundamental human rights.

3) Politicians can never vote to increase or maintain legal access to abortion. For them, as for every Catholic, it is impossible to promote such laws or to vote for them.

4) Politicians can support laws that limit abortion even if those laws still allow some abortions to be legal, if the politician knows it's not politically possible to pass a total ban.

5) Catholic politicians who vote for laws or fund bills that promote abortion should not present themselves for Holy Communion because they have committed the grave sin of formally cooperating with a grave evil.

Consider all this when you vote in the upcoming November 3 election.

Sorrowful Mother Monument for the Unborn

Parishioners at St. Mary's Catholic Church (Our Lady of Perpetual Help) and Albany community members at large now have a place of solitude to pray for the unborn around the clock, with the recent blessing of the Sorrowful Mother Monument for the Unborn on the north side of the church.

The project, which includes benches which invite parishioners to spend time in contemplation, was spearheaded by the Albany Knights of Columbus Council 1577, according to Patrick and Teresita Parson, the state K of C Life Culture of Life directors. "This project has been in development since 2017," Patrick Parson said. "That's when the church administrator first approved it. The project has undergone many changes from concept to completion."

Parson said the original idea was for the monument to be much smaller, but that changed as the Knights began looking at statues.

Parson said an early stage concept was "a sad angel, a weeping angel," but Father Edwin Sanchez said that angels don't have emotions.

Another concept was to have a statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary weeping for the victims of abortion. But when the project leaders saw a statue of the Blessed Mother, her arms crossed and her head bowed as though in prayer, they knew it was the right one.

"Past Grand Knights Jon Kieffer and Bob Weiler were keys to this project," Parson said. "They made sure the ball didn't get dropped along the way."

The 70-inch statue came from New York. "When it arrived, the pandemic was underway, so it was stored in a garage for a few months," Parson said. The first of many steps was to pour a concrete slab and add a base for the statue. "The statue is made of a fiberglass resin material," Parson said. "This was something new for all of us. It took about a half-dozen Knights to install."

The statue was installed on May 4 and was the site of a Novena for Life on May 10.

In June, benches were added, as was a plaque commemorating the site. It reads: The Sorrowful Mother Monument for the Unborn. "Did He not create them in the womb like me? The same God forming us in the womb?" Job 31:15.

Flower planters and flowers added color and capped the project. "Other locations were considered, but the north side of the church provides a peaceful spot," Parson said. In September, during Archbishop Alexander Sample's visit to the church, the statue was blessed along with a new Parish Center.

The Oregon Knights of Columbus 4th Degree Assembly assisted with the ceremony. "This project commemorating the unborn could not have happened without the support and enthusiasm of Albany Knights," Parson said. "I am proud to be part of the organization, and believe every Catholic man should consider becoming a Knight of Columbus."

Parson said the project cost about \$9,000 and was paid for by Council 1577, a grant from the state K of C and a donation from the Fourth Degree Assembly 906.

"We are very pleased, very happy that everyone will be able to see the Blessed Mother and have a welcoming place to pray for the end of abortion and to preserve the sanctity of all lives," Parson said.

The Parsons publish a monthly online Knights of Columbus pro-life newsletter "Oregon, That's Life" in English and Spanish.

Tom Radel State Advocate Once you have turned in your Officers Chosen (185 Report) and Program Personnel (365 Report) to Supreme for the new Fraternal Year, the Grand Knight, Program, Family and Community Directors will receive an email to complete the Safe Environment Training. You will have about **30 days** to complete the Safe Environment

Advocate Training. Note: leaving one or more of the Council Director roles vacant on the 365 report Does Not exempt a

Council from Safe Environment requirements.

If the training is not completed within the 30 days, the Knight will not be recognized by Supreme in their Director's role and a new 365 will need to be submitted with either a new name or the same name.

The purpose of the training is for Brother Knights serving in key leadership roles to safeguard children and other vulnerable persons by recognizing the signs of possible abuse.

This is part of the Columbian Award so if not completed by all four positions of your Council your Columbian Award will not count, hence your Council will not gain Star.

The training is easy and not time consuming and good for three years.

Group Training can be done by Councils or Districts, **BUT** each member needs to have their own computer or laptop with each member. **NOTE: Each Member Must Sign On Under His Own Name To Get Credit.**

Date For Councils To Be Compliant: 50% of Councils by Oct. 1st and 75% of Councils by Dec. 1st

As of 8/3/20 the Armatus Report shows 2 Councils with 100% compliance – 5416 Silverton and 9137 Sherwood.

Let all work together to reach **100%** compliance of all Councils at the earliest date, so we can concentrate on membership and programs.

Otto Leroy Smith 18th State Deputy of Oregon 1942-1944

Otto L. Smith was born on February 22, 1899 in Waynoka, OK to James and Elizabeth Trompeter Smith.

The family moved to Oregon in 1905.



Otto married Mildred May Dryden on November 16, 1921 in Clackamas, OR. They moved to Klamath Falls in the 1930's and had four children: Phyllis Louise, Luana May, Darlene and Patrick. Patrick was a Staff Sergeant in the 431 AAF Bomb SQ during WWII and was killed in an automobile accident in 1945.

Otto Leroy Smith



Creative Printing at its Best

Otto became associated with the Smith-Printing Co. in 1934 and purchased the business from W.O. Smith in 1956 and operated it until his retirement in 1967.

Otto joined the Knights of Columbus as a charter member of the Klamath Falls Council in 1921. He was Grand Knight of the Council from 1934-1936 and Faithfull Navigator from 1944-1945. Otto was also District Deputy, District Master and vice

Supreme Master of the Junipero Serra Province.

Otto was invested as a Knight of St. Gregory on August 30, 1964, by decree of Pope Paul VI, thus becoming the fourth man in the history of Oregon to be so honored.

Otto was involved with the Boy Scouts, Red Cross, Klamath Falls Rotary Club, Chamber of Commerce and the Elks Lodge.

Otto L. Smith died September 30,1971 of a heart attack and is buried Mount Calvary Catholic Cemetery, Klamath Falls, OR. Mildred died in 1992 and is buried next to Otto.

Angels are on my mind today. On Tuesday we celebrated the feast of St. Michael and all the archangels – who are our patrons. Mount Angel is named after our motherhouse in Switzerland, Engelberg Abbey (literally "angel mountain" in German), which is celebrating 900 years of continuous existence this year. We monks participate in a deep tradition and relationship with the angels.

The monastic life has long been compared to the angelic life. If you know monks, this might make you smile. We certainly chuckle at the thought, too. But what it really means is that monks are dedicated primarily to the praise and contemplation of God, as are all the angels.

I know it can be difficult for contemporary people to take angels seriously. They can seem quaint, harmless, but surely no one believes in them any more, right? But look...

If you want to take the Bible seriously, you really have to take angels seriously. Biblical stories are saturated with angels. As we read them, we can develop a sensitivity to the reality of the angelic world.

In my video message, https://www.mountangelabbey.org/monastery/abbot-jeremy/abbot-jeremy-videos/? bblinkid=243612665&bbemailid=24674200&bbejrid=1666134032 I list the tales of a number of encounters between Old and New Testament figures and angels. Abraham, Moses, Gideon, and Isaiah – who heard the angels crying out before the throne of God, "Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of hosts" – a sacred song we sing in the liturgy.

Through the whole of the New Testament, angels abound. In one compelling image, Jesus recalls the story of Jacob's dream of a ladder, when he tells his disciples they will see the angels ascending and descending upon the Son of Man, his very self.

These are not decorative ideas, dear friends. But what do they have to do with us?


God has given us the angels as friends. They help us adore God. They protect us from our spiritual enemies. They are involved in God's dealings with us. That's what the saints are too.
