September 3—Memorial

Patron Saint of musicians, singers, students, and teachers

A gifted nobleman served Rome, became a monk, a Bishop and then a consequential pope.

When your salad is *awesome*, your car *amazing*, and your internet connection is *great*, there's a problem. Overused superlatives diminish their own meaning and crowd the linguistic space reserved for things which are truly awesome, *amazing*, and *great*. This saint sent the large missionary party that trekked across Europe and converted Saxon England to Catholicism, and had established a culture that endured for almost a millennium. **That's** *awesome*!

He wrote a theological work that was used for centuries by thousands of bishops to help them become more fatherly pastors. **That's** amazing! Gregorian chant is named after him; he is one of the four Latin Fathers of the Church; he was the



first pope to use "Servant of the Servants of God" as a papal title; he alone preserved the memory of Saint Benedict with a true biography; he made revisions to the content and structure of the Mass which are part of the liturgy until today; and he was the most impactful pope of the long span of centuries from the 500s to the 1000s. **That's** *great*! These accomplishments thus truly merit the well used term *Great* with which Saint Gregory has been justly crowned by history.

Pope Saint Gregory the Great was born into a noble Roman family with a history of service to Church and empire. The family home was perched on one of Rome's seven ancient hills, the Caelian, which Via San Gregorio still cuts through today. His father was also Roman senator, although at a time when Italy was in decline and the imperial government was based in Constantinople. Gregory received an education in keeping with his class and became the Prefect of Rome, its highest civil position, in his early thirties. In 579 he was chosen by the pope as his emissary to the emperor's court in Constantinople, primarily to seek the emperor's assistance in protecting Italy from the Lombard tribes that had long ago overrun her.

Gregory was elected the bishop of his home city in 590 and was thus obligated to abandon the quiet life of a monk, which he had been living with some friends for a few years in a small monastery near his family home. In numerous letters which have fortunately all been preserved, Pope Gregory, soon after his election, bemoans the loss of his monastic solitude, peaceful recollection, and life of prayer. But he had only been a monk for a few short years. Gregory's skills as an administrator, honed in his long years of prior civil and church leadership, proved valuable when he sat on the Chair of Saint Peter. He drew into the orbit of papal authority the bishops of France and Spain who had, until then, been operating somewhat autonomously. He secured the allegiance of Italy's northern tribes to orthodox Catholicism, compelling them to abandon the counterfeit Arian Christianity they had held for centuries. And Gregory made the fateful decision to personally organize and promote the great, and highly successful, missionary journey of Saint Augustine of Canterbury to the Kingdom of Kent in England.

Pope Saint Gregory the Great's legacy in liturgy, pastoral doctrine and miracles left a deep mark on medieval Europe and beyond. The Council of Trent in 1562 mandated the suppression of votive Mass cycles for the dead or for any other need. But the Council Fathers made one exception: The Mass of Saint Gregory, a cycle of thirty Masses on thirty consecutive days for the release of a soul from purgatory, were not suppressed. Almost a thousand years after his death, Gregory's memory was too venerable to suppress. Gregory was a bishop who modeled, strengthened, and explained how and why his fellow bishops should be fathers first and lords second.

Pope Saint Gregory the Great, your example of holy leadership, scholarly practicality, balance between universal and local concerns, helps all Christians weigh their many duties in a proper balance and to choose correctly what matters most to God and their own salvation.

No Coats for Kids programs, no Ultra-sound machine donations, no Leave no Neighbor Behind program, Wheelchair Initiative, or Seminarian assistance through RSVP. I could go on and on. Because each year Knights of Columbus donate hundreds of millions of dollars to charitable programs and volunteer tens of millions of hours helping their neighbors and their communities. What if there were no Knights of Columbus?

The world, the countries that the Knights of Columbus touch, would be a much bleaker place. Countless millions of people would face more hardship and there would be much less joy and hope. Think about that—and that is just on a national and world level. Think about all the local communities right here in Oregon! Who would be building the wheelchair ramps for the disabled seniors? Who would be mowing the lawns and cleaning up the parish grounds? Who would be leading the Rosaries and the Eucharistic processions? Who would be helping out at all our parish communities with the thousands of everyday tasks that need to be done? Probably no one!

Don't think that could happen? Well it already is. A lot of Councils are struggling. Some have been inactive for a year or more. So, with inactive Councils, parishes, communities and individuals are facing more challenges. Because there are no longer any Knights of Columbus in their parish. Why? Several reasons, but mostly that the current group of Knights have gotten older. Some have died, some have grown ill and most no longer have the energy they had 10 years ago. It's inevitable. Also it is that the Councils that are struggling are the ones that have not done a good job of recruiting.

Why?

Why would you not want to ensure that the good that your Council has done for your parish will continue? Why would you not want the same joy that you found helping others, to be experienced by your younger parish neighbors. Why would you not want to see the impact that the Knights of Columbus bring to continue?

Because for many of us, talking to strangers and trying to recruit members is "out of our comfort zone". Granted, there are fewer people these days who want to give of themselves, to belong to an organization like the Knights of Columbus. So, it's more difficult to recruit. But that doesn't mean we shouldn't try. That doesn't mean there is no one out there that feels the same as you did when you joined.

We have to stretch ourselves, and invite our fellow Catholic men to join the Order. We have to make our programs and our Faith more visible, to make it more attractive to Catholic men, to let our works be a beacon that draws Catholic men to the Knights of Columbus. Finally, we have to continue to be the men that our priest rely upon to help them to run their parishes.

Perhaps it is the years of schooling we all go through, but September always seems to hold the promise of a fresh start. As students begin a new school year and parishes open new faith formation classes, so too can Knights of Columbus Councils hit the reset button on their meetings, programs and Council activities.

As a Council chaplain, you have a vital role to play in working with your Grand Knight to ensure that Council programs meet the needs of the local parish while equipping men to become missionary disciples. The monthly Council meeting is not simply an opportunity to read minutes and just pass resolutions; it should be an engaging time of fraternity, prayer and faith formation that spiritually

renews all who attend. A meeting can even be open to non-members, if approved by a Council vote. Generally, monthly meetings should last no longer than 60 to 90 minutes — busy husbands and fathers should not feel that they are sacrificing important family time to attend a meeting that leaves them tired or bored. They should return home feeling inspired, as well as connected to other men of faith and ready to be a powerful witness to their families. This may mean a radical shift in how your Council views its fraternal gatherings and conducts its business.

By speaking at the beginning of each meeting, you can set the tone for what will follow. As Chaplain, you have an awareness of the needs of the local parish and how Knights may contribute to building up the body of Christ. There are many resources available to help inspire members. The <u>Into the Breach</u> video series is a great way to engage members in prayerful reflection and to encourage them to share their own experiences. Additionally, praying the Divine Mercy Chaplet, as well as the rosary or the <u>Litany of Blessed Michael McGivney</u>, or setting aside a time for intercessory prayer at the end of the meeting, can help Knights remain spiritually connected.

I encourage you to work closely with your Council officers to reset your Council meetings, programs and activities, so that your Council will be attractive to young husbands and fathers and have the missionary dimension of the Gospel at its core. *Vivat Jesus!*

44th State Deputy of Oregon 1993-1995




Robert J. Kligel passed away on August 25, 2021, in Vancouver, WA following a prolonged illness. He was born on September 22, 1944, to Carl Kligel and Marian Vent in Eastern Oregon.

Robert lived in Pendleton, OR during his early life. Robert attended Gonzaga Preparatory School in the early 1960's where he was active in football, basketball, track, baseball, drama and the St. Joseph Academy. In 1966 he attended Gonzaga University and was part of the ROTC.

Robert married Mary Palmer in Marion County, OR on October 18, 1969. The couple first lived in Chicago, IL and then returned to Oregon to live.

Robert became a member of the Knights of Columbus on March 1, 1969. He served as Grand Knight of the Newberg Council 6602 from 1981-1983. He then served as District Deputy and Master. Robert served as State Advocate from 1985-1988, State Treasurer from 1989-1991 and State Secretary from 1991-1993. He was elected State Deputy at the 1993 State Convention held in Klamath Falls, OR where he served as State Deputy from 1993-1995.



Later Robert served as State Historian and was widely known for his colorful comments at later State Conventions.

The Funeral Mass will be held at St Peter's, 2315 N Main St., Newberg, OR 97132 on September 24, 2021. There will be a Rosary at 10:30 a.m. and the Funeral Mass follows at 11:00 a.m.

State Secretary's Report

Worthy Brother Knights,

I hope that everyone has had an excellent couple of months for the start of this Fraternal Year!

I've been starting to get used to the State Secretary position and all that it entails. I have great people who are around me who are helping me, supporting me and I have been able to do the same for them.

I've gotten most Summer Meeting expense reports taken care of at this point (still waiting for a few). I trust that everyone was able to get their reimbursement checks at this point. If you have other valid State related expenses, feel free to send them in and we will review them and make sure you are reimbursed fairly and appropriately.

I've received a several emails and calls regarding State Convention reimbursement. Just a reminder that State Conventions are not reimbursable dollar for dollar like it is for Summer Meetings and Winter Meetings. Designated personnel (the State Officers, DDs, Directors, Delegates, etc) are reimbursed mileage and per diem \$25/day for each day they are actually present. Since this is the case, no expense reports are needed for State Conventions. The State Secretary/State Treasurer will just do it automatically for every designated person i.e. Officer, Chairman or delegate who attends (just for State Conventions).

Also, if you are a Delegate, the reimbursement check will go to your Council Financial Secretary (FS). You'll work it out with your FS about getting the funds to you. All other designated personnel get directly reimbursed. It still sounds at this point that not everyone has yet received their per diem check. Please let me know if you have not received it yet and we will work that out to make sure you get the per diem.

The State team is looking forward to working together with everyone in Oregon. We believe that it is very important to hold everyone accountable (and one another) by carrying out the tasks we've volunteered to do and we also believe in being as honest and transparent as possible with everyone. This means that anyone is always welcome to ask us questions at anytime, including inquiries about the status of their expense reports.

Finally, I wanted to clarify for everyone that when they submit expense reports to me for State level reimbursement, I will audit them and check for receipts. If I see any discrepancies, I'll raise the issue and work to resolve it. This is not because I don't trust anyone—It is a requirement of my job! I hold all members of the Knights of Columbus with the highest amount of respect and consider all members to be full of integrity. However, I just need to make sure that expense reports are correct and accurate. If I see any errors, I will still assume that people are submitting in good faith and simply work to resolve with them the issue. So I ask that people not take it personally if I raise some questions about submitted expense reports.

I look forward to working with everyone throughout this Fraternal Year. The entire State team hopes to establish a strong presence around the State and show our support for the Councils and the community.

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<u>State Advocate's Report For September</u> Knights of Columbus

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Worthy District Deputies, Council Officers and Brothers all.

In this issue of the State Advocate's report, I would like to address with you, three areas of concern, that are imperative to the well being of our order. The first is our Safe Environment Program, second is our ceremonials and third is our Vocations in particular, RSVP.

Safe Environment

As we now enter the third month of the new fraternal year, Supreme, has published the latest report of non-compliance for our Safe Environment program. The most critical area of the report focuses on the time for completion of the course, based on the activation date of training assigned by Supreme. In general, the Community and Family positions need to have their training and background checks completed between the 9th and 27th of September. If any Council or individual knight needs assistance in any area of the Safe Environment program, especially with attempting to complete the training course or the paperwork that is necessary to file for the background check, please call or email me. My contact information is at the end of this message. We will provide direct assistance to all who need our help. It is imperative that Councils file there form 365 and 185 asap giving the state and Supreme the names of the officers who need to be involved in the training.

Safe Environment is a requirement mandated by Supreme as one of the pre-requisites for Star Council. We, as Catholic gentlemen and heads of our families, have a need to understand and complete the course. This need resonates even greater when we think about it helping to protect our loved ones..

Also, I must repeat and emphasize the immediate need to correct an area that is approaching a very critical problem for our state's Councils. The area that needs work gentlemen is <u>forms reporting</u> and the need for your Council to file your Form 365 and 185 if you haven't done so already. Unfortunately, the September 3rd report from Supreme indicates that 53 of our 96 Oregon Councils have not filed Form 365, the program personal report. 29 Councils have not filed a Form 185, report of Officers chosen.

Both forms are extremely critical to the operation of our Councils. The information contained therein is necessary to know who is responsible in your Councils to complete the Safe Environment course and be the responsible parties for your Council. I ask our District Deputies to please, review with your Councils the filing of those two critical forms. We need them filed as soon as you can complete your officer selections. To the Councils and Knights who have filed and are compliant, the state officers and I are very grateful for your diligence. We will again, host a S/E training session on a Saturday in the near future. This will be a virtual offering again. Please watch for an email announcing the date of the event.

Ceremonials

The State Degree team is available to assist all our Councils and Districts with the 1st through 3rd Degree ceremony. We have since July 1st put on several in person on-site Degrees and made almost all the ceremonies available via the internet. If your Council or District would like to have the State Team host your Degree, please let me know two weeks in advance if possible and we will plan to be at your disposal.

Please remember that it is imperative to have your District Deputy file a Form 450, report of a Degree as soon as possible after the ceremony has been completed. It may be filed on-line by the District Deputy or by the State Ceremonials Director if need be. This is a very important step in the process of keeping our state on a firm footing with membership.

Please consider contacting our state Membership Director, Brother Chris Cummings, for his assistance if you have questions about new membership. He is an excellent resource for you and his work directly relates to growing your Council and our participation with you and assisting you with the ceremonials.

Vocations/RSVP

Some Council Vocations Directors have begun to contact me on behalf of their Council's participation in the RSVP program. Thank you, Brothers, for your inquiries and be assured that now, as the seminarians return to their respective schools the applications for aid from us will begin to come in shortly. For those of you who are new to the workings of the program, I ask you to contact me at my email address below. You will be supplied with the two information and procedure packets that we have composed. Last year nearly 36 separate donations were filed. The K of C Oregon state charities board last year presented to the Mt. Angel Seminary a monumental donation from the magnificent work of our Councils. I would like to acknowledge the work of our Tigard Council. They alone were responsible for generating the funds necessary to make eight separate donations to requesting seminarians possible. Thank you, Brothers and keep up your great work.

I would like to ask all our Councils to please refrain from calling personally and making inquiries to the seminaries. Due to budget restraints and certain personnel shortages, your request may not meet with success. We ask that you again contact me at my email or phone number supplied below. Please let me assure you that your questions will be answered, and you will be doing a great favor for the seminary. Realize if one or two members of ninety Councils start calling for any reason, to ask questions of the seminary staff who are now limited, they will become overwhelmed. Please contact me, the state Vocations Director and you will be answered.

Brothers, lets try to end this first quarter with a rush to complete our missing forms, a new vigor for membership and a start of our good works of charity, for all who we can help.



Joseph Walter Ford

27th State Deputy of Oregon 1962-1964



Joseph Walter Ford was born on April 17, 1912 in Denver, CO to Edward and Margaret Ash Ford. The family moved to Deer Trail, CO where Joseph attended grade school.

Young Joe traveled to school in a covered wagon.

The family then moved to Newberg, OR in 1920 where Joe attended high school and then to the University of Portland which he graduated in 1936.

Joseph married Marie Nemec on May 15, 1941 in Lake Oswego, OR and the couple had five children.

The first 12 years of Joseph's working career was in the grocery business and the next 25 years worked in the building business.

Joseph was a charter member of the Lake Oswego Council 3818. He served as Grand Knight of the Council and District Deputy from 1956 to 1957. Joseph also served as State General Program and State Membership Directors. He was elected State Deputy in 1962 but never held any other State Office.

Joseph Walter Ford died November 24, 1994 in Lake Oswego, OR and is buried in the Sacred Heart Cemetery, Lake Oswego, OR.

Marie died in 2019.



Mt. Angel Library History

Some Historical Facts

Mount Angel Abbey was founded in 1882 by Benedictine monks from the Abbey of Engelberg in Switzerland. The monks quickly became involved in pastoral work and in education, and in 1889 opened Mount Angel Abbey Seminary. The Swiss monks brought a sizable library with them to Oregon. Unfortunately, only a few books survived a disastrous fire in 1926, which destroyed the library as well as the rest of the Abbey. The few volumes which survived reminded later generations of monks of their roots and of the generosity of the founding monastery.

The nucleus of the current library collection was secured in 1932, when the contents of a used bookstore were purchased in Aachen, Germany. For the next twenty years, as the monks worked to rebuild the Abbey and the seminary, the library's new collection grew slowly. In 1952, Fr. Barnabas Reasoner, O.S.B., returned from library school to become the director. He then introduced modern library procedures and began to build the collection. Fr. Barnabas adopted the U.S. Library of Congress classification system and planned the new Aalto-designed library, which was dedicated in 1970. In the late 1980s and early 1990s, library director Fr. Hugh Feiss greatly expanded the library's holdings in philosophy, Patristics as well as Latin Christian studies.

Mount Angel Abbey Library's collection continues to grow in size and quality. Like libraries all over the world, the Abbey's own library must be concerned about the conservation and the preservation of materials.

It seems as though traditional books, while they will not soon disappear, but many realize that other media are here to stay as well. The threat to libraries does not come from the media, but from cultural forces which denigrate study and argument, faith-seeking understanding, and thoughtful exchange among people of different times, places and viewpoints. In the face of such forces, libraries – Mount Angel Abbey Library among them – are becoming more concerned to promote and foster a much greater understanding through study, argument and conversation.
