Our Lady of the Rosary

The Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, formerly known as Feast of Our Lady of Victory and Feast of the Holy Rosary is now celebrated on October 7th in the General Roman Calendar.

According to Dominican tradition, in 1206, Dominic de Guzmán was at the Monastery of Our Lady of Prouille, in France, and was attempting to convert the Albigensians back to the

Catholic faith. The young priest had very little success until one day he received a vision of the Blessed Virgin, who gave him the Rosary as a tool against heretics.

The story of Dominic's vision was recorded by Alanus de Rupe, a 15th-century Dominican friar who is credited with promoting the Rosary among the faithful in Europe. This traditional origin for the Rosary was generally accepted, including by many popes, until the 17th century, when the Bollandists concluded the account originated with the account recorded by Alanus, two hundred years after Dominic's death. However, several popes after the 17th century, like Pope Leo XIII and Pope Pius XI, continued to attribute its origin to Dominic in official documents such as encyclicals.

Our Lady of Victory

Mary had been honored in the West under the title "Our Lady of Victory" from at least the thirteenth century. Simon de Montfort, who was the 5th Earl of Leicester built the first shrine dedicated to Our Lady of Victory in thanks for the Catholic victory over the Albigensians at the Battle of Muret on September 12, 1213. In thanksgiving for victory at the Battle of Bouvines in July 1214, Philip Augustus of France founded the Abbey of Notre Dame de la Victoire, between Senlis and Mont l'Evêque.

Background

In 1571, Pope Pius V organized a coalition of forces of Spain and smaller Christian kingdoms, republics and military orders, to rescue some Christian outposts in Cyprus, particularly the Venetian outpost at Famagusta which, however, surrendered after a long siege on August 1st before all of the Christian forces set sail. On October 7, 1571, the Holy League, a coalition of southern European Catholic maritime states, sailed from Messina, Sicily, and met a powerful Ottoman fleet in the <u>Battle of Lepanto</u>. Knowing that the

Christian forces were at a distinct material disadvantage, Pope Pius V called for all of Europe to pray the Rosary for victory, and led a rosary procession in Rome. Pius V instituted the feast of Our Lady of Victory in order to help commemorate the victory at Lepanto, which he attributed to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

After about five hours of fighting on the northern edge of the Gulf of Corinth, off western Greece, the combined navies of the Papal States,

Venice and Spain managed to stop the Ottoman navy, slowing the Ottoman advance to the west and denying them access to the Atlantic Ocean and the Americas. If the Ottomans had won, there was a real possibility that an invasion of Italy could have followed so that the Ottoman sultan, already claiming emperor of the Romans, would have been in possession of both New and Old Rome.

Combined with the Great Siege of Malta (1565) and the unfolding events in Morocco where the Sa'adids successfully spurned the Ottoman advances, it confined Turkish naval power to the eastern Mediterranean. Although the Ottoman Empire was able to build more ships, it never fully recovered from the loss of trained sailors and marines, and never again the Mediterranean naval power it had become the century before when Constantinople fell.

In 1572, Pope Pius V formalized the number and content of the Mysteries of the Rosary and actively promoted its recitation. In 1573, Pope Gregory XIII changed the name of the feast into Feast of the Most Holy Rosary of the Bl. Virgin Mary, to be celebrated on the first Sunday of October. Then the Dominican friar, Juan Lopez, in his 1584 book on the Rosary, states that the feast of the Rosary was offered "in memory and in perpetual gratitude of the miraculous victory that the Lord gave to his Christian people that day against the Turkish armada".

In 1671, the observance of this festival was extended by Clement X to the whole of Spain, and somewhat later Clement XI, after the victory over the Turks, gained by Prince Eugene in the Battle of Petrovaradin on August 5, 1716 (the feast of Our Lady of the Snows), commanded the feast of the Rosary to be celebrated by the universal church.

Leo XIII raised the feast to the rank of a double of the second class and he added to the Litany of Loreto the invocation "Queen of the Most Holy Rosary". On this feast, in every church in which the Rosary confraternity has been duly erected, a plenary indulgence is granted upon certain conditions to all who visit therein the Rosary chapel or statue of Our Lady. This has been called the "Portiuncula" of the Rosary. During his pontificate, Leo XIII issued eleven encyclicals about Our Lady of the Rosary and its feast.

<u>Pius X, in 1913</u>, changed the date to October 7th, as part of his effort to restore celebration of the liturgy of the Sundays. In 1960, under Pope John XXIII, it is listed under the title Feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary of the Rosary; and under the 1969 liturgical reforms of Pope Paul VI, Our Lady of the Rosary is mentioned as a mandatory memorial.

Fraudulent Emails

Dear Brothers;

It has come to my attention that some of you may have been receiving fraudulent emails from myself and perhaps other State Officers (I know of two others). I apologize for any inconvenience and/or confusion this may cause you.

It is hard to tell you when one of us may have been hacked or where they may have gotten hold of a state-wide list. Most of our Passwords have been changed, but unfortunately, once they get hold of a list, it is difficult to stop. A couple of things to look for:

1. Gift Cards / Money - As Knights, we contribute to a lot of things and we do send out requests for charitable giving, i.e. the most recent email on Special Olympics. We do not ask you to get random gift cards or send any one of us money directly. If it seems bogus, it probably is. If you have questions, do not reply to the email directly - Start a new email or call me directly.

Look for clues that indicate possible fraud. Spelling/ Grammar errors. We all make them but look for the more obvious ones.

Hover over the sender's email address. The latest one that I supposedly sent came from: Grandknight@brainerd.net.
Hover over links to make sure they are correct. It is very easy to create a link that says Click here to donate to Special Olympics but when you hover over it, where does it actually take you? Again - Call or email if you are confused.


3. The vast majority of 'official' state business, with those particularly involving donations, will come from our Executive Secretary, Tim Grady.

Faith Formation (COR)

Archbishop William Lori

I wouldn't be worth my salt if I didn't put in a plug for *Cor*. As you all know, there are many men's spirituality programs, and these have been around for quite a while — and they are certainly a step in the right direction. But men's spirituality is our "natural space" as Knights of Columbus.

The principal reason why Blessed Michael founded the Order was to help the men of his parish to recover their faith or to stay close to the faith at a time when they were lax in coming to Church on Sunday, often neglectful of family responsibilities, and attracted to the secret societies of the day, societies inimical to the faith. Blessed Michael was above all a parish priest who was concerned that if the faith of fathers and husbands faltered, so too would the faith of their children and young people. His pastoral concern in the latter part of the 19th century is very relatable to our pastoral concerns in the 21st century.

Cor provides a path for men's spirituality better than anything else I've seen. It is rooted firmly in the principle of unity — one Lord, one faith, one baptism. It is rooted firmly in the principle of fraternity — it is a fraternal sharing of faith, a building of trust, a willingness to discuss what really matters at the core of our existence — **Cor ad cor loquitur**. It is rooted firmly in the principle of charity — for when the truth, the depth, the beauty of God's love dawns upon us, then his love shapes how we live our vocations, how we relate to others, including fellow Knights, and how we reach out to those who are in need.

Cor is more than instructional, important as that is. After all, even many of those in the pews are not well instructed. **Cor**, while helping to address such deficiencies, helps men to allow the gaze of Christ to penetrate their hearts. The gaze of Christ reveals us to ourselves, shows us areas in our lives that need to be changed, moves us to conversion and so clears the way for the grace of the Holy Spirit to work in us. Put another way, **Cor** helps men to believe in the love God has for them so that they, in turn, can be men of authentic charity at home, in their parishes, in their Councils, and in the wider community.

Maybe you've noticed an uptick, even an upsurge, of younger people who are turning to the faith, coming back to Church, many of them on college campuses but many also in our parishes. Many of them have come to see the emptiness of their own contemporary culture and the anxieties and sadness it produces in so many lives. The same is true of younger men, including recently married men, who are searching for their place at home, in the Church, and in the world. The increase in membership the Order experienced over the past year speaks to this search for truth, for meaning, for purpose. *Cor* corresponds to that very real need. As chaplains, we are also pastors who care deeply about the spiritual lives of those we are privileged to serve. Your support for *Cor* will greatly influence your State Deputy and officers as well as your fellow chaplains throughout your jurisdiction. It is both our past and our future: It is what drove Blessed Michael to found the Knights, and it is our mission as we look to the future in hope.

Let me say once again how grateful I am to Father Kalisch for the support he continually offers you in your roles of service and how grateful I am to all of you for your leadership and service to the Knights of Columbus. We are blessed with the leadership of our supreme knight, Patrick Kelly.

The future is bright, and God's grace is abundant. Let us seize the moment, the day the Lord has made!

Chaplains Report

Spiritual Accompaniment on the Final Journey

A palpable sense of Blessed Michael McGivney's presence still pervades Thomaston, Connecticut, where he was pastor from 1884 until his death in 1890. His image still greets visitors to the Thomaston Opera House, where Father McGivney directed young adults in patriotic and cultural plays, and the town proudly claims him as their own. Marriage licenses signed by Father McGivney are displayed in the city clerk's office, and pilgrims can visit the spot where his parish church and rectory once stood, though both were torn down and rebuilt elsewhere after his death.

Perhaps the most poignant memorial to Blessed Michael's priestly presence is the St. Thomas Parish cemetery. There, pilgrims can climb the hill where Father McGivney would have accompanied dozens of his parishioners on their last earthly journey. Dates on the headstones identify members of the Body of Christ who would have heard Blessed Michael preach the Gospel and received the sacraments from him. Truly, from this cemetery, the faithful witnesses of Blessed Michael await the general resurrection.

As November approaches, we should encourage our Brother Knights and their Councils to take an active part in tending graves and cleaning up local cemeteries and neglected gravesites in need of care.

In doing so prayerfully, we not only honor those who have gone before us but also exercise a spiritual charity toward the souls in purgatory. This may provide an opportunity for catechesis on the last things and the Church's teaching about death, which can help prepare our Brother Knights for this encounter. May Blessed Michael, whose prayers often accompanied his parishioners on their final journey into eternity, continue to inspire us to lead our brother Knights into the kingdom that awaits us all.

Worthy Sir Knights, it is the highest honor of Knighthood to be a 4th Degree! Thank you for all you do!



Ordination and installation of the new Bishop of the Diocese of Baker

The ordination and installation of the new Bishop of the Diocese of Baker, Thomas Hennen, was held on Monday, September 29, 2025, at 2:00 PM Pacific Time at St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church in Bend, OR.

Background: Pope Leo XIV accepted the resignation of Baker Diocese's previous bishop, Liam Cary, and appointed Father Thomas Hennen as the Bishop-elect on July 10, 2025.

Fr. Hennen served as a priest of the Diocese of Davenport and served as its vicar general and rector of the Sacred Heart Cathedral. He is the youngest bishop leading a U.S. diocese at age 47.

Sunday October 5th was a big day for the Parishioners of St. Francis de Sales Cathedral Parish as their newly ordained Bishop Thomas Hennen celebrated his first Mass at the Mother Church of Baker Diocese. The K.C. Council 849 and the Parish Altar Society coordinated a tasty Texas French toast, sausage, fresh fruit, juice and coffee breakfast reception as part of the welcoming for the Bishop.

During the breakfast, Deputy Grand Knight Ron Rowan gave a special welcome to Bishop Hennen. "Welcome, Bishop Hennen, to the Baker Diocese. As it said in today's responsorial psalm, "For he is our God, and we are the people he shepherds, the flock he guides". We look forward to you guiding us and serving as the shepherd of the diocese."


"As our shepherd and leader, and as a token of our appreciation, we present to you this cowboy hat. It represents the culture and values that have been established in the west over the last 200 years."



October 2025 Community Directors Report

Brothers/Worthy Sir Knights

This year, Supreme had a limit of 131 cases of coats that they would match one for free with each one we purchased, as they only had \$ 300,000 to spend on this project. With that being the case, we were required to have our orders in by September 15th to receive the BOGO offer. After evaluating the orders they received by September 15th, they were able to provide us with an additional 46 matching cases. As a result, we wound up with 177 matching cases of coats. Counting the cases that were not matched, we had a total of 363 cases of coats this year—great job to all of you who had participated in this very worthy project.

I apologize that not all Councils were not able to take advantage of the BOGO offer. Due to limited availability this year, the distribution was on a first-come, first-served basis.

Next year, Councils should be prepared to have their Coats for Kids orders into the state by September 10th so that we can submit our orders to Supreme before the 15th to qualify for the BOGO offer if it is offered again next year.

There is no better way for your Council to highlight the importance of family than by recognizing families through one of the most meaningful and accessible programs the Knights offer—the Family of the Month program*.


Each month, select one parish family that models Christian family values and visibly lives them every day. Recognize the family by presenting them with a Family of the Month certificate (Certificate PDF) at a Mass or other Parish event and recognize them in your parish bulletin. Report the selection of the family to Supreme (Fraternal Programs Report Form 10784) where they will be entered into a national drawing. (Each month, 100 families are selected and honored by Supreme with a framed certificate signed by the Supreme Knight himself.) Finally, report the honored family to the state by completing the Family Report Form (State Forms – Oregon Knights of Columbus).

Here in Oregon, my goal is simple: to get every Council involved. Imagine if we had 100% participation. That's not just 12 families per Council per year—it's hundreds of families across our state being lifted up, encouraged and celebrated. Think about the message that sends—not just to those families, but to the entire parish community. Together, let's build up our Church and our Order—one family at a time.

*The **Knights of Columbus Family of the Month** program recognizes a parish family each month for their outstanding contributions to the Church, Council, and community.

The award is given to families that model **Christian family values** and demonstrate commitment to nurturing the Catholic family.

Each Council establishes a committee to select a deserving family, promoting strong and vibrant family life.

The selected family is honored for their service and inspiration to the parish and community.

This program aims to strengthen family bonds and encourage active participation in church and community activities.



Fraternal Benefit Events (frequently asked questions)

How does a Council qualify for the "Founders Award"?

- To qualify for the "Founders' Award" a Council must promote and host two (2) Fraternal Benefit Events (FBE) (virtual or in person).
- **New this year**: If the GK and DGK meet individually with their agent for a personal review of fraternal benefits available to them, these two meetings will count as one of the two required FBE's.
- The Founders Award remains one of the requirements for Star Council.

What are the attendance requirements?

- For Councils with 99 or fewer members, the sum of both events must equal or exceed 10 eligible attendees.
- For Councils with 100 or more members, the sum of both events must equal or exceed 14 eligible attendees.
- Eligible attendees must be "unique members" Meaning, you can t count the same person twice.
- Eligible attendees must be a member or membership eligible. Meaning, they must be male, 18 or older and a practical Catholic. Others (ladies and children) can still be present; they just aren't eligible to be reported as attending.

If a Council has 23 eligible attendees at their first FBE, must they still have a second?

Yes, a Council must host a second FBE, even though they exceeded the attendee requirement. Who can present or run our "In-person" FBE?

· Your local Field Agent and/or General Agent presents a FBE to the families of the Council and/or Parish. Work with your Priest and Field Agent to select a date and location. Advertise the event in the parish bulletin, fliers, posters, etc. The Council hosts the event. The Agent presents the FBE.

The Council can provide refreshments for the attendees. Provide a signup sheet for all attendees.

How do we organize a "Virtual" FBE?

You should organize a virtual FBE much like the in-person FBE. Your State and/or Supreme will notify you in advance of all virtual events so you can plan for them. You should still advertise the event in the parish bulletin, fliers, posters, etc. The Council hosts the event. The FBE presenter will be virtual.

Be sure to have a computer, workable internet, large screen, projector, and speakers (much like a movie night). The Council can provide refreshments for the attendees. Provide a signup sheet for all attendees.

Why do we need a signup sheet?

- You need to track who is attending. You will need their name, email, and phone number of all those that qualify for reporting later to Supreme.
- Only report eligible attendees (see above).

How do we report our FBE?

- The GK must now report the results of their FBE directly to Supreme. This can only be done using the online Form »11077.
 DO NOT SEND MANUALLY AND DO NOT SEND TO YOUR GENERAL AGENT
- When you complete and submit your form-11077, the GA will automatically be sent a copy, and he has the option to review and dispute your reporting.

Where do we find Form #11077?

- Open Supreme's website, pick on the red "FOR MEMBERS" box.
- Scroll down and pick the blue "FORMS" box.
- Go to Council Forms.
- Scroll down and pick Form #11077 "Fraternal Benefit Event Council Report".
- Complete the "Online preferred method".
- At the bottom of the form, you must now verify your eligible attendees. You can pick the circle for "I will load an image" where you must upload your signup sheet. Or pick the circle "I will manually enter" and then enter all eligible attendees' names, email, and phone number.
- Pick the blue "SUBMIT" box and you're done.

Transferring an Online Member to a Local Council (frequently asked questions)

I recruited a new member using the online join process, does he now become a member of my Council?

- No, a new member who used the online join process does not automatically become a member of a local Council. You may have recruited him during a Council church drive, and he may have entered his "Preferred Local Council" number while joining, or the state may have assigned him your local Council number, but he does not automatically become part of your local Council.
- New members that use the online join process are automatically enrolled into a 5 digit "State Online Council" that starts with 98xxx. Example: California 98004, Texas 98042, Idaho 98011, Colorado 98005
- The address he entered while joining will determine what state online Council he is enrolled in, and that state will get credit for that new member.

What can this member do while in the State Online Council?

- This member is now a Knight of Columbus. He can purchase our insurance products, receives a special membership card, receives the Columbia magazine, can take part in state and local activities, and can attend local Council meetings.
- Since he is not yet a member of a local Council, if he attends local Council meetings, he should be recognized as an "Online Member". He can't vote on local matters or hold any Council position.
- Currently those who joined online, joined for free for 1-year. Once they are transferred into a local Council, they could start paying those local Councils dues, but we would hope you still honor the 1-year free.



How long can he remain in the State Online Council?

These members can choose to stay in the "State Online Council" indefinitely. There are many reasons why some members prefer not to transfer or take part in local Council life.. job, family, military deployment, the time commitment, only wants our quality life insurance, etc., etc.

How do we get this new online member transferred into our local Council?

- When he joined online and entered his "Preferred Local Council" number, his name and all his contact information will now show on that preferred local Councils "Prospect Tab" in Officers Online. Pick on the members name and all his information will pop-up.
- The FS and GK will receive an email each time a new member enters their "Prospect Tab".
- The FS and GK have access to the "Prospect Tab" and both can make additions. Check to see if you have any online members in the "Prospect Tab" right now. you might be surprised to find several members waiting there to join your Council.

The transfer process

- 1. Contact the online member. Call him and invite him to some of your local Council events. Get to know him. At some point, assess his interest in joining your Council and explain the benefits of being a member in your Council. Inform and instruct him on the next Exemplification of Charity, Unity, and Fraternity.
- 2. Run him through your Council's admission committee and vote on him.
- 3. If he is accepted, arrange for him to take his Exemplification (live or virtually).
- 4. Immediately after taking his Exemplification, the FS or GK should open the "Prospect Tab" in Officers Online and enter the "Ceremonial Date" of this member and then pick the blue "Transfer" box.
- 5. If the member has already received his Exemplification elsewhere, on another date, then put the current date in the "Ceremonial Date" box. This way it doesn't override his initial Exemplification date.
- 6. In a few days the transferred online member will be removed from 98xxx and show on the local Council's roster.

What if there are concerns about his eligibility or he decides he doesn't want to join our Council?

- Whether the member declined membership in your Council, or there are concerns about his eligibility or your Council didn't vote in his favor, you do have the option to reject his membership into your Council.
- Here again. The FS or GK can go the "Prospect Tab", go to this member, and pick the blue "Reject" box.
- A pop-up will appear where you can select the reason for the rejection... 1-Eligibilty concerns, 2-Council incompatibility 3-Does not want to transfer.

Councils need FOUR Life Activities to earn this part of the Columbian Award as part of the requirements for STAR COUNCIL. Remember the ULTRASOUND activity and Pregnancy Center Support are "Featured Programs", so doing those will count for TWO of the four. So, you get more "bang for the buck" if you do those.

The Council that raises the most funds for a Pregnancy Resource Center or for the ASAP program will also win a monetary award from the State Council!







What Are The Seven Acts of Mercy?

The Seven Acts of Mercy, are also known as the Corporal Works of Mercy, and are Essential teachings in Christian tradition that guide how we should treat others in need.

- 1. Feed the Hungry: Provide food to those who are in need, recognizing that hunger is a basic human issue.
- 2. Give Drink to the Thirsty: Offer water or other beverages to those who are thirsty, ensuring access to this essential resource.
- 3. Clothe the Naked: Provide clothing to those who lack adequate attire, helping to protect their dignity and well-being.
- 4. Shelter the Homeless: Offer shelter or support to those without a home, ensuring they have a safe place to stay.
- 5. Visit the Sick: Spend time with and care for those who are ill, providing comfort and companionship during their time of need.
- 6. Visit the Imprisoned: Reach out to those who are incarcerated, offering support and compassion to those often forgotten by society.
- 7. Bury the Dead: Honor the deceased by ensuring they receive a proper burial, respecting their dignity even in death.

Each Council earns \$10/member newly initiated into a Council between Jan 1, 2026, & Mar 31, 2026.

Example: If a Council brought in 3 members per month for the first nine months, they could earn: $9 \times $20 = 180 , plus $9 \times $15 = 135 , plus $9 \times $10 = $90 = 405 Total



The Wall That Heals

It was with great honor that our Knights of Columbus Honor Guard participated in a ceremony of remembrance at *The Wall That Heals* in Independence, Oregon, on September 19, 2025. This solemn event honored the more than 58,000 of our military members who lost their lives in Vietnam.

On Veterans Day in 1996, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund (VVMF) unveiled a replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., designed to travel to communities across the United States. Since its dedication, *The Wall That Heals*® has been displayed in nearly 800 communities, carrying the Memorial's healing legacy to millions.


Bringing *The Wall* to local communities allows the souls enshrined on the Memorial to be remembered among family and friends in the comfort of familiar surroundings. The traveling exhibit has given countless veterans the strength to confront the experience of *The Wall* and begin or continue the healing process within their own communities.

The exhibit consists of two main components: a three-quarter scale replica of *The Wall* and the mobile Education Center. During the 2024 season, *The Wall That Heals* traveled nearly 20,000 miles, visiting 29 communities across the country. More than 3,000 vehicles escorted the exhibit into host communities, and nearly 200,000 visitors experienced its powerful message of remembrance and healing. Guided tours were provided to more than 20,000 of those visitors.

Knights of Columbus Jubilee Pear 2025 — Pear of Hope



Worthy Brother Knights,

I have been asked by our Worthy State Deputy Bob Adams to carry on the Jubilee Chairman position for the remainder of this calendar year. It is an honor to be able to promote this Jubilee Year of Hope. This happens once every 25 years, so it's an opportunity that comes rarely, I encourage everyone to take full advantage of this Jubilee Year.

First of all, I wanted to share with everyone what a Jubilee Year is. A Jubilee Year is a special time in the Church's tradition encouraging holiness through acts of reconciliation and communion with our brothers and sisters. Jubilee Year 2025 will be marked by special opportunities for grace through the Sacrament of Reconciliation, local pilgrimages and the Jubilee Indulgence. A Jubilee Year happens once every 25 years.

A special jubilee plenary indulgence will be offered as a special grace during the Holy Year, freeing the faithful from the spiritual effects of all past sins. To receive it, Catholics must be truly repentant (free from all attachment from sin, including venial sin), go to Confession within about 20 days before or after, receive Holy Communion, pray for the Pope's intentions, and perform a spiritual act such as a pilgrimage to a designated pilgrimage site, charitable work, or dedicated prayer. Ordinarily, the faithful can only receive one plenary indulgence per day. However, the faithful are able to gain 2 jubilee plenary indulgences per day and the second one will be applicable to the souls in purgatory.

Message from Pope Francis: "We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us, and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and far-sighted vision. The forthcoming Jubilee can contribute greatly to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth that we so urgently desire; that is why I have chosen as the motto of the Jubilee, Pilgrims of Hope."

Jubilee Pilgrimages:

I wanted to remind everyone of the **Jubilee Punchcard**. One of the primary activities and events during this Jubilee Year is making a pilgrimage to one of the pilgrimage sites designated in the Archdiocese of Portland and Diocese of Baker. If you visit 8 of the 12 sites, then you will be entered into a drawing of 1 of 2 \$100 gift cards. This is intended to be used for a dinner for 2. Photo evidence is required for each site as proof.

In addition to pilgrimages, the Jubilee Year is an opportunity for Acts of Mercy and Charity. Help those in need by performing acts of kindness like feeding the hungry, visiting the sick, or supporting charities. These acts count when done with sincere love and repentance. The Archdiocese of Portland has identified monthly thematic events to focus on these the acts of mercy.

Assistance to the Homebound:

If someone is unable to travel due to illness, age, or confinement, they can still receive the indulgence by praying at home, following Mass through media, and offering their struggles to God. Knights can offer assistance by serving as Extraordinary Ministers of the Holy Eucharist, praying with the homebound or perhaps assisting them to follow mass by helping with their phone or computer (Or bring one with you).

Knight Involvement:

How can the Knights be involved? Well first and foremost, you can make personal pilgrimages to various designated sites or organize a group pilgrimage. This is an opportunity for personal spiritual growth. In addition, if your Council is at a pilgrimage site or near one, work with the pastor to organize meaningful jubilee events. Get the whole district involved if possible. Consider organizing a jubilee event as a Council (include Confession, Mass and/or Holy Hour, Rosary, a meal afterwards, and a talk on the virtue of hope or history of Jubilee Years). Consider having a prayer breakfast that is Jubilee themed. Also incorporate a work of mercy corresponding to the monthly theme. 


State Historian Report

Rev. Kevin Bertram Mulligan 37th State Chaplain of Oregon 1979-81

Kevin Bertram Mulligan was born June 15, 1922 in Dunalk, Ireland to Joseph and Margaret Watters Mulligan.



His baptismal name was Kevin and his religious name was Bertram.

He graduated from Rochestown High School and entered the Capuchin Franciscan Order on October 3, 1941 and made his Solemn Vows on October 4, 1945. He also received his college education at the University of Ireland, Cork City, Ireland, and graduated in 1945. He was ordained a priest on June 16, 1949.

In September of 1949 he was sent from Ireland to serve at St. Joseph Church in Roseburg, OR as the associate pastor. He then served as associate pastor at St. Mary's in Ukiah, CA and then Our Lady of Angels in Hermiston, OR, 1952-54. Afterward he served as Pastor at St. Aloysius in Point Arena CA, Our Lady of Good Counsel in Fort Bragg CA, St. Mary's in Ukiah CA, Our Lady of Angels in Burlingame CA, and St. Joseph in Roseburg, OR in 1974.

He then served as a hospital chaplain at the VA Hospital in Fresno, CA. He was the first Guardian of St. Francis of Assisi Friary in Burlingame, CA. In 1998 he was named Provincial Archivist for the Western America Province.

Rev. Mulligan joined the Knight of Columbus in 1953, was a charter member of Hermiston Council, and a charter member of Ft. Bragg, CA Council. He was the Oregon Knights of Columbus State Chaplain 1979–81.


In 2007 he retired at Mercy Care and Retirement Center in Oakland, CA.

Rev. Kevin Bertram Mulligan died on October 29, 2016 in Oakland, CA. He is buried at the Capuchin Cemetery in Santa Ynez, CA.




